REFLECTION

Who am I and what do I do?

What is possible and what is not?

These two questions have been bouncing around in my mind this week. As we enter March 2021, in Lent and as Lock Down restrictions begin to ease, I dare to look forward to what may be ahead for our World, our community, our faith and our Benefice. When Moses comes down from Mount Sinai, he had ten very powerful, life-giving words that will eventually get engraved in stone.

“I am the Lord your God, who brought you out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery.”

These Ten commandments underpin much of the justice system. As I reflect on them, it reminds me of what God has already done, and the focus which is on the relationship between God and God’s people. When we worship God, today and in the future, we come across and encounter the holy, and a system of religion that has changed, shifted and evolved over time. In the Old Testament time, worshipping God revolved around six hundred odd rules of behaviour and life style, plus the rules of animal sacrifice, and the exchange your Roman coins for currency that Jewish scribes and Temple leaders would accept.

We find Jesus attending one of the great religious festivals of the Jews. Hundreds of thousands of pilgrims would have been in Jerusalem. The practice of selling sacrificial animals did not occur within the temple itself but within the temple courtyard or the Courtyard of the Gentiles. The courtyard was large, perhaps the size of two or three football fields.

We can easily visualize the money changers, the oxen, sheep, pigeons and the general chaos in the Temple area, especially in the Court of the Gentiles. People would bring their Roman and Greek coins with images of the emperor on those coins. Such coins were inadmissible in the temple because they were unclean due to the pagan image of the Caesars on those coins. Those coins with the image of Caesar would have to be exchanged for Jewish “kosher” coins. The money-changers made good profits. Larger animals like oxen and sheep were also bought and sold, as were pigeons for the sacrifices for poorer people. The costs of sacrifices were inflated fifteen times

The reputation of Jesus had already spread. Jesus had produced his first mighty miracle, the turning of water into wine.

Jesus making a whip out of cords is graphic in this very vivid scene of chaos. He starts overturning the tables and driving out the merchants. Jesus didn't mess with *one* money changer and *one* table. He drove them all out.

We may notice that this scene in the temple isn't just about anger. Jesus is cleansing away those aspects which are not centred on God's message about love, the law, the commandments, and the gestures of forgiveness,

Today, the true force of the cross of salvation is known and people can live forgiven and free lives because they know their God has claimed them forever. It's the life the Ten Commandments were intended to foster and flourish and the message that God is always trying to get across.

Jesus said: “You shall love the Lord your God, with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind. This is the first and greatest commandment. And the second it like this. You shall love your neighbour as yourself.

God's wisdom that is deep and true, is available to everyone through the ultimate and final sacrifice. Jesus' life given on the cross.


Human nature has not changed. Many aspects of how we approach our faith, how we worship God, live out our discipleship can be influenced by many different strands in our lives. Religious practice can sometimes get in the way of how we connect with God. Does it relate and be relevant to the world we live in? Does it reach out to those who have not 'Come to Christ' as followers?

In this image of the Trinity, we see a community surrounding a table. It's circular in movement. All embracing. It's not about a particular building or place. It's not about who has control or the leader. It's about sharing, and offering each other expressions of grace, mercy, love and service to each other. The circle can be extended and embrace everyone we encounter.

As we look ahead, so many things in life seem impossible. Can we imagine what life, church, our mission will look like? How can we engage others and bring them to faith? How can we make our churches sustainable and strong for the future ahead?

We all will be called at some time to do something that seems impossible. Maybe you will feel that you are ready, not smart enough, hate change, or that you are not strong or capable enough to do these things. But when God calls you—that means you can do it in God's strength and wisdom, He created us each to be who we are, to do what He calls us to do.

Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy mind," before also paraphrasing a second passage; "Thou shalt love thy neighbour as thyself." During this season of Lent, we listen for God to see what we can learn, to see how we can grow, to see how we can fly. And we know that with God, we can live the life God calls us to live, we can be what we are called to be, adapt and change in order to come alongside those who may not yet have heard God's call.
